Internal Responsibility System

The Internal Responsibility System (IRS) is the underlying philosophy in the OHSA.



Every individual, worker, supervisor, manager, senior executive, etc. is responsible for health and safety and has specific roles to maintain a safe and healthy workplace as well as improve unsafe working conditions where necessary.



The Internal Responsibility System does the following:

Establishes responsibility sharing systems;

Promotes a safety culture;

Promotes best practices;


Helps develop self reliance; and,

Ensures compliance.





Penalties for Non-Compliance



A successful prosecution could, for each conviction, result in:

- A fine of up to \$100,000 for an individual person and/or up to 12 months imprisonment;
- > A fine of up to \$1,500,000 for a corporation.
- More scheduled offences(tickets) with increased fine amounts.
 Supervisors, Employers and Constructors can be ticketed!



Initiatives

Occupational health and safety inspectors carry out their initiatives to:

- raise awareness of hazards
- ✓ increase compliance with the *Occupational Health and Safety Act* and its regulations

Provincial health and safety compliance initiatives focus on specific hazards or topics and have two phases:

During phase 1 of the initiatives the ministry focuses on education, outreach, and awareness



During **phase 2** the ministry conducts a focused **inspection blitz**




Excavation Compliance Industry Trends


<u>Locates and Underground Services – s. 228 January 1, 2017 ~ December 31, 2021</u>

- > **256** orders were issued.
- Most orders issued were stop work orders (125)
- > A balance in terms of proactive (inspection 54%) and reactive (investigation 46%)
- Order frequency increased from 2020 But this is still below the average!

Reason for MLTSD Presence







Trench Work and The Need for Shoring – s. 234 (1) January 1, 2017 ~ December 31, 2021



Part I Ticketing and Summons



S. 224 – No person shall enter a non-compliant excavation:

43 Tickets/Summons

S. 228 – Valid Locates are required: **18 Tickets/Summons**

S.233 – The top of the excavation must be kept clear:

17 Tickets/Summons


S. 234 – Shoring and sloping is required: **5 Tickets/Summons**

S. 240 – Ladder access for workers: 6 Tickets/Summons

S. 241 – Positioning of the support system above the excavation walls: **7 Tickets/Summons**
